Since it's February now, I guess we can stop saying Happy New Year!

I think we've held on to that greeting of celebration a little longer than usual this year, mostly just to make sure that 2020 was really over! We are well and truly into 2021 now, and there are some important and meaningful days ahead.

Last month we spent some time focusing on what it means to be the church. The sentence we shared was: A healthy church is built on a foundation of Jesus Christ, and expressed through fellowship, worship, discipleship and mission.

That's been a good focus for us. It's easy in a year where everything was disrupted to lose sight of who and how we're called to be. Spending those four Sundays on the nature of the church was a reminder that God calls us together to be a reflection of his love to each other and to the world. We need that prompt every so often.

That will lead us to two messages coming up in early February. The Sermon on the Mount is the longest recorded teaching of Jesus that we have. It stretches across almost three full chapters in Matthew's gospel (5-7), and shows us how to see the world through the values of the Kingdom of God, Jesus' favorite thing to talk about. Early in this sermon, in Matthew 5:13-16, Jesus teaches us about how the world should experience us, as Salt and Light. We're going to spend two Sundays on those ideas as a way to build on what we learned in January about being the church.

That will take us to the next season in the church year, the season of Lent. I'll say more about this in the coming weeks, but for now I'll simply say that Lent is such an important time—it invites us to reflect and repent and prepare our hearts for the joy of Easter. We'll begin that season with Ash Wednesday on February 17th—soon we'll be sharing some special ways to honor that day.

For now let me invite you to continue to pray for our church and our witness in this community. We bring all kinds of traditions and shades of belief to our life together, but let's be united in our commitment to be reflections of Jesus Christ here in SLO and wherever else we might be. We're on this journey together, and I look forward to seeing what we do next!

Blessings to you and yours. Stay safe and healthy, and remember to wear your masks.

GREEN PASTURES GREEN PASTURES MINISTRY TEMPORARILY CLOSED

The Green Pastures ministry that provides needs assistance to 200-400 community members a year, is temporarily closed due to the COVID-19 virus and the difficulty in providing a safe environment to administer the program.

During the interim the Green Pastures staff is providing funding to other Community organizations such as the Salvation Army to provide assistance for those in need. Green Pastures will reopen when the Church campus is open again and it is safe for staff to offer this mission.

ENDOWMENT CREATE A LASTING LEGACY

2020 WAS A GOOD YEAR FOR FPC ENDOWMENT

One of the good parts of 2020 was mutual fund returns. First Presbyterian Church of San Luis Obispo Endowment is invested in the Balanced Growth Fund, part of New Covenant Funds owned by the Presbyterian Church USA Foundation. After a loss in the 1st quarter the Balanced Growth Fund ended the year with a healthy gain.

The growth for the year was approximately 11.7% or in dollars, \$74,878. This growth bodes well for significant 2021 allotment to help pay for FOCSLO operations, programs and missions. The Endowment Committee voted for and recommened to Session an allotment, up to 5% of 2020 year end account value. The Session at it's Jan meeting approved the 5% allocation, for a total of \$33,055.19,

In addition to the market gain, the Endowment received generous donations during 2020 to create the Marysue Wilson Chapman Bell Choir Endowment and the Dorie Larson Green Pastures Endowment. There were also additional gifts to the Carrie Vermeer Community Outreach Fund and Sharon L. Kaml Hand Bell Endowment. Thank you to those recent donors and all donors who have created our Endowment.

15-Minute LENTil Soup Recipe (Serving for 1)

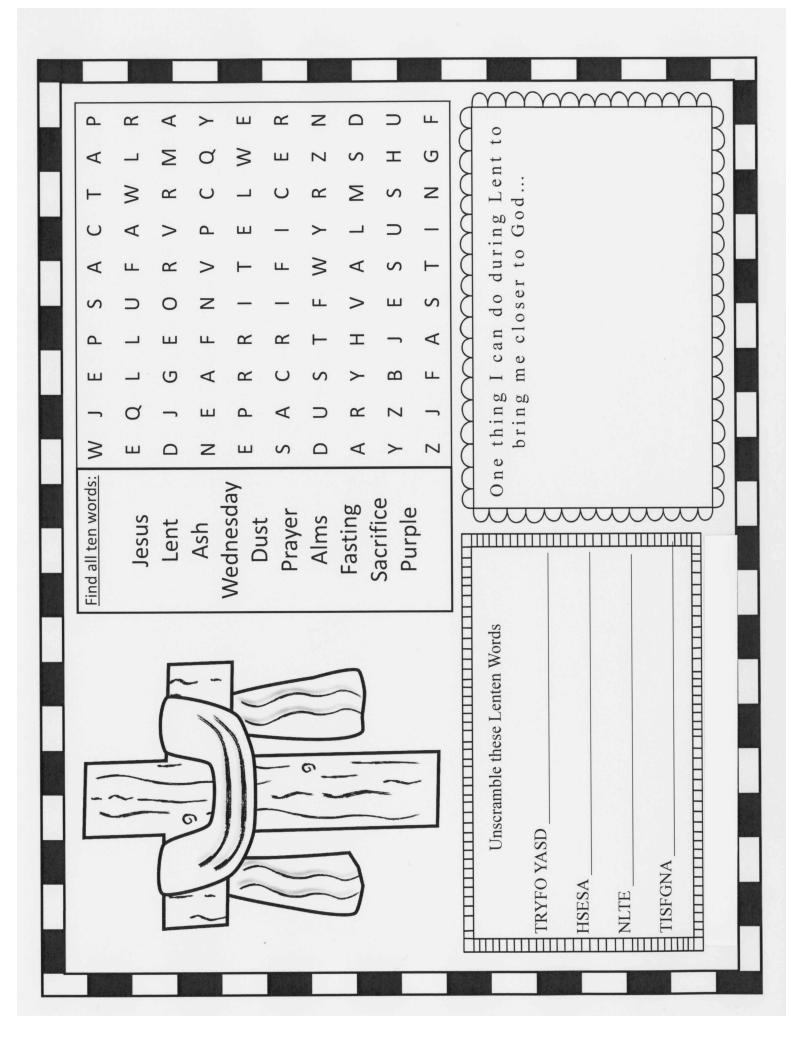
teaspoon extra-virgin olive oil
small onion, finely chopped
carrot, finely chopped
celery stalk, finely chopped
garlic clove, minced
Coarse salt and ground pepper
founces low-sodium vegetable or chicken broth
cup cooked lentils (from a 15-ounce can), rinsed and drained (available at California Fresh and Smart & Final)*
teaspoons red-wine vinegar

Directions:

In a medium saucepan, heat oil over medium heat. Add onion, carrot, celery and garlic; season with salt and pepper and cook, stirring occasionally 3-5 minutes, until onion softens. Add broth; bring to a boil and cook 5 minutes. Add lentils and cook 3 - 5 minutes, until soup thickens slightly. Stir in vinegar and season with salt and pepper to taste. Enjoy!

*You may substitute dried lentils, but you will need to cook them first. They are very easy to cook and you can prep them in advance:

Rinse ³/₄ cup dried lentils. Add to 2 cups water. Bring to rapid simmer. Reduce to gentle simmer, cook uncovered 30 min. Drain. After draining, add ¹/₄ tsp. salt.





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
