Every once in a while a line from a song catches my ear...or knocks me sideways. It can me something small, like a nice turn of phrase or a clever connection. Sometimes it's the way a part of a song describes something I'm feeling, but in a way that I didn't expect or see coming. Does that ever happen to you?

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Jackson Browne was my favorite singer when I was young. He wrote so many great songs, and often he captured a sadness or melancholy that resonated with my teenaged brain. In one song he said:

Maybe people only ask you how you're doing because that's easier than letting on how little they could care. But when you know that you've got a real friend somewhere, suddenly all the others are so much easier to bear. (The Late Show, 1974)

There's a beauty to songs that get the heart of something that needs to be put into words. Here are some other examples—you'll probably recognize these:

Hello darkness, my old friend, I've come to talk with you again.

I can hear her heartbeat for a thousand miles, and the heavens open every time she smiles.

Sometimes a lyric can describe a moment in a way that's just unforgettable.

The screen door slams, Mary's dress waves. Like a vision, she dances across the porch as the radio plays.

I say all that because words are important. Language is one of the important ways that we relate to each other—that we connect with each other. It's in words—the words of the Bible—that God shows us what God is like. Words are so important.

Over this summer we'll hear a series of messages that link to lines from songs. Some are from hymns, others might be from more contemporary worship songs, and others will be from popular songs you might hear on the radio. These lines from songs will point us in a direction for hearing what the Bible has to say to us on any given Sunday.

Here's an example. In the hymn *Come Thou Fount* of *Every Blessing*, we hear this line:

Prone to wander, Lord, I feel it, prone to leave the God I love.

It's such a sad and beautiful description of our tendency to put distance between us and God. It puts words on a feeling that we all have at times, and allows us to confess, even as we sing God's praise. It helps that it resolves with a statement of humility and hope!

Here's my heart, O take and seal it, seal it for Thy courts above.

I hope this journey through some lines from songs will be a meaningful one for you. I'm calling the series (and I'm proud of this one), A Fine Line.

Come and worship with us this summer, as we see what God is doing—and how God is working—in each of our hearts and lives.

FRONT PORCH

As the school year comes to a close, it is always time to pause and reflect. There has been lots of behind the scenes activity at the Board level as efforts are made to clarify the relationship between Front Porch and the University Ministry Board of the Santa Barbara Presbytery, which oversees Front Porch.

On the ministry side, Front Porch has continued to expand and flourish with increased numbers of students stopping by on a regular basis. The number of volunteers who staff the coffee house has grown. Alumni support has increased, both in terms of hands-on activities, such as providing a Wednesday night meal or offering an occasional class for students to take, as well as contributions. Currently there is a student led campaign to raise \$6,000 towards a new stove. The original residential stove installed over 10 years ago has far out lived its usefulness. A new commercial stove, which is necessary, costs around \$12,000. As students directly benefit from the use of the stove (some Wednesday night meals are prepared at Front Porch), they wanted to help. I'm sure any additional help would be appreciated if someone wanted to donate to the new stove fund.

With increased student participation in Front Porch, it is evident that having three interns is essential. Front Porch has always provided housing as part of the intern stipend. Currently there are only two bedrooms available to house interns, and thus two interns need to share a small room. As recent college graduates, I'm sure they would prefer to have a room to themselves, but they have accepted this situation. There is room available in the manse next door that could be remodeled to provide a third bedroom and second bathroom for the interns. This summer will begin a capital campaign to raise the necessary funds to improve the living situation for interns. Again, any support for this campaign would be greatly appreciated. Alternately, if you have a spare bedroom and bath that you would like to donate for use during the school year, that would be welcomed. I can say from personal experience that it was a positive experience for Craig and myself the year that we housed Jenna.

PEACEMAKING AND SOCIAL JUSTICE WELCOME HOME KITS

We are all aware of the problem of homelessness in our community. Whether we see the homeless on the streets or in tents along the roads, we are very conscious of this painful situation. You may have read or heard in the news recently that many groups in the county are working together on various solutions to create permanent housing for those who live on the streets. One of those groups is Community Action Partnership of San Luis Obispo County (CAPSLO), which oversees the 40 Prado Homeless Shelter.

This summer, we have an opportunity to participate with CAPSLO by filling and donating Welcome Home Kits that will be given to people as they transition from homelessness to permanent housing. Those who have been living at a shelter or in a car or motel often don't have basic kitchen and household items to bring with them when they move into an apartment. Presenting them with a Welcome Home Kit is a way to spread joy and hope while we live our mission, "to glorify Jesus Christ and to be instruments of God's healing, reconciling, lifegiving presence in the world."

Everyone at First Pres can participate with the Peacemaking and Social Justice Committee on this project as an individual, a family, a group of friends, a PW Bible Study group, the youth, a walking group, the choir, a Date for Eight group, or a church committee. These are just some of the many ways we can work together donating single articles or filling boxes with kitchen and household items for Welcome Home Kits.

ENDOWMENT CREATE A LASTING LEGACY LEGACY SUNDAY 2023

Peggy Estes, a member of the Endowment Committee, delivered the Legacy Sunday message on May 7th. Her goal was to plant a seed or maybe to give a good *nudge* to those considering a legacy gift to FPCSLO. The following column is a condensed version of Peggy's message.

What does it mean to leave your legacy? Well, typically it's you when you share your gifts with others to benefit future generations once you've passed on. These gifts can have intrinsic value, for example, an heirloom quilt you've created or one of the crosses at the front of the sanctuary, like those made by Warren Hansen and Barbara Wines' husband. The gift could also have monetary value like a bequest or an endowment, which are essentially donations.

Creating an endowment doesn't require a large donation. While we do have endowments that have grown to six figures, most of our endowments are much smaller. Most legacy gifts to our church are modest amounts.

During the first couple years of the pandemic, it was our church's endowments that made the difference and really helped to keep our church afloat. Do you want our church to continue sustainably into perpetuity? Might there be another crisis that needs our help? Have you given this any thought? Ask yourself,

- Do I care about my church's future?
- Do I want it to live on after I'm gone?
- Do I want to continue my support to the church to help fund its future after I'm gone?

I care about my own family members who survive me and I plan to help provide for them, but how about my church family that I have faithfully supported for so many years?

- Honestly, ask yourself will my survivors, my son or daughter, leave part of my estate to the church all on their own without any guidance or nudging from me?
- What message or example do I wish to leave for them? What guidance did my own parents offer me? What did I do when they passed? Will my daughter do any differently? Will your survivors do any differently.

Here are a couple of pretty simple things we can all do now to help our surviving family share our gifts with our church after we're gone:

> • If you have an IRA, you can make the church a beneficiary. If living, your spouse or partner, could be your primary beneficiary, but then the church could be an additional primary or a contingent beneficiary at even 25% or 50% of the residual balance. This is easy to do.

• How about just adding a single line to your will that states, "after all my bills have been paid, I wish to give 10% of my remaining assets to my church." This is also easy to do and would only require a little assistance. Those of us on the committee would be happy to help if you have any questions.

So, think about it, what will be your legacy?




