PLANNING AND PONDERING ...

We have often been called to re-think what it means to be the Church. To re-think what being a follower of Christ means for us. As we plan and ponder what First Pres SLO will look like post pandemic, I think we have been given a beautiful opportunity. As God's people, we have come to a place where we can create new and adapt old approaches to our ministries and programs. Since March of 2020, we have learned how to participate in all new ways. We had to abandon some things, adapt other things, and create new things. Most of us had to learn how to use technology in all new ways. I, for one, thank God for those who already knew how to use technology and remained patient and offered those of us who "don't get it" most days a lot of grace. We have grieved losses and celebrated successes - under protocols that were

hard but necessary to follow. We have redefined so many things. And, it feels like we are about to redefine so many things again. We have adapted and have been creative with the way we managed - everything - since March 2020.

As we emerge from the pandemic, we are called to explore and rethink our ministries and programs for the months and years to come. Our calling might be the same, but our community is not. I believe we cannot go back to doing things just like we did. Through all of this, we have been given the space to rethink and re-envision who we are and who we want our community to know we are. How will we go about being the church in the future? We have the opportunity to take the time and space to figure that out. Not only figure it out but test it out. All those feelings and experiences are valid. We need to acknowledge there is no "normal," new or otherwise—what does "normal" even mean? As we think about our programs and ministries, what values are guiding them? Are we inviting God in? Are we listening and observing? Are we figuring it out together—with Gods help? We cannot and should not do any of this on our own.

It has been a year plus! Perhaps we should take the time to ask ourselves;

- *Where have you seen God at work?
- *What has given you strength?
- *What are you grieving?
- *What do you need to leave behind in order to move forward?
- *What are two or three next steps you can take not only for yourself but for the church?
- *Think about who stayed, who was found, who is missing? Consider each name and their story and pray for them.

I know I am excited about the future and all God has to show us as we move forward. My hope is that we continue to invite God in-in all that we do. And that we continue to love God and then love people. May we see God's hand at work in new and creative ways each day as we plan and ponder and honor our traditions and those who came before us.

We continue to look for a couple of people who would love to work with the Youth. If you know







God bless us all, Gloria DeKleine Neuroscientist Explores the Power and Potential of Our Lives, by Daniel J. Levitin, is a book that has been added to the library and is on the book cart ready for borrowing.

This author looks at the science behind what we all can learn from those who age joyously, as well as how to adapt our culture to take full advantage of older people's wisdom



and experience. Throughout his exploration of what aging really means, using research from developmental neuroscience and the psychology of individual differences, Levitin reveals resilience strategies and practical, cognitive enhancing tricks everyone should do as they age.

<u>Successful Aging</u> inspires a powerful new approach to how readers think about our final decades, and it will revolutionize the way we plan for old age as individuals, family members, and citizens within a society where the average life expectancy continues to rise.

ENDOWMENT

With two weeks to go in the second quarter of 2021, the endowment value is looking good and the allotted amount is being used to enhance First Pres SLO missions and operations. The 2021 allotment of over \$33,000 added to unspent allotments from previous years provides total funds available greater than \$45,000. As of midyear, about \$19,300 has been used by Missions, Youth Ministry/Christian Education, and General Operations Support (resources that would not otherwise have been available). Let us be thankful for these bountiful assets.

Committee Chairs, please note there remains about \$26,000 allocated for various needs.

This column in August 2021 will report the performance results at the halfway point; but—spoiler alert—it is going to be good. In spite of the yoyo character of the securities market lately, New Covenant Funds Balanced Growth Fund has continued to grow.

Thank you to those who have invested in our church's future by donating to our endowment or have included First Presbyterian SLO in their will or trust. All gifts are used as the donors specified.

Have you prepared your will? NOW! is the best time to do it.

BUDGET & FINANCE

This is the first of monthly financial status reports in the Kirk. In summary, our financial situation looks good as of May 31.

Our total giving as of May 31 is \$221,017. This is nearly 45 percent of the budgeted giving when we are 42 percent through the year. Review of our giving status as of May for the past 10 years shows this year being in line with past years. Thank you for your faithful giving, even during the pandemic.

Total income is \$241,251, which is \$20,421 higher than the straight-line projection. One reason for this is the one-time endowment income allotment of \$7,952 for the year that was added to general income by the Treasurer.

Our spending is \$225,480, which is \$4,650 higher than the straight-line projection. We have incurred some unexpected expenses, particularly in the administration and unplanned property maintenance line items. We recently had to eliminate a termite problem at a cost of several thousand dollars. Another unexpected expense to be incurred soon is the repair of fire doors, expected to cost thousands of dollars.

Since total income was higher than total expenses, we added \$15,771 to our total reserves (i.e., savings account) for total reserves of \$95,812. Reserves may be tapped if necessary to meet unexpected expense levels.

Expenses in the worship, education, and congregational life committees have been significantly below plan because of curtailed activities during the pandemic. We anticipate increases in these committees, and perhaps in staffing, once we resume in-person worship and education programs. Your continued giving will enable FPCSLO to continue and to enhance our service to the community.

CONGREGATIONAL LIFE COMMITTEE

The Congregational Committee will continue to bring Friday Night Bingo games about once a month. We keep adding to our prize box with contributions from the congregation. Keep an eye out for information in the Weekly Peak. We are also working on a Musical Evening coming up in late July or early August. This will include various musicians from the church on a Zoom platform.

We are planning a **Sunday BBQ on September 12 at 5 p.m.** in the parking lot! We are excited to be working with other committees to bring you this event for a gathering and sharing of a meal! More details will be coming soon.
