#### **NEHEMIAH COMING HOME**

We reopened cautiously on July 25th, and so far things are going pretty well. I chose the text and message very carefully for that Sunday, and I want to share some of it with you here.

We looked at the story in Nehemiah 8:1-10, where the walls of Jerusalem were rebuilt after Judah came home from exile. Now that needs some background detail. After King Solomon died, his sons couldn't agree on who would take over, and in the end the northern region became Israel, and the southern part became Judah—it's in Judah where we find Jerusalem and some of the other holy places.

Over time Judah forgot the covenant with God that gave them possession of the land in the first place. They get taken into exile, and by the time we pick up the story they've returned to their home, rebuilt the Temple for worship, and now they're shoring up the walls around the city so they can be safe.

Part of coming home meant hearing the Law of God—that's shorthand for the first five books of the Bible (the Torah). They stood outside and listened to the words and they were heartbroken at how far they had strayed from who they were supposed to be and how they were meant to live.

Their return home was a mix of joy and grief. It came with a call to live up to their covenant with God.

When the people heard who they were meant to be, they wept.

When they heard just how far they had strayed from the covenant, they wept.

When God's people heard what God expected of them, they wept.

Nehemiah could have spoken words of judgment.

He could have called down punishment on the people.

Listen to what he said instead.

"This day is holy to the LORD your God. Do not mourn or weep. Go and enjoy choice food and sweet drinks, and send some to those who have nothing prepared. This day is holy to our Lord. Do not grieve, for the joy of the LORD is your strength."

Let's get this straight. God's people were taken into exile because of their disobedience, and when they came back they were reminded of why they were in trouble in the first place.

Nehemiah and the other leaders of Judah read them the Scriptures, then told them all to have a party. And just in case anyone was left out, they said to make sure everyone had some good food and good drink so they weren't left out.

God's people in the time of Nehemiah made a priority of keeping each other safe—that was the point of the wall. They focused on the future of who they were called to be. They read and reflected on the Scriptures as their guide to understanding what God wanted from them. And they celebrated and shared with their neighbors.

I think this story from our Bible says something about our reopening. Of course, our story is different—no one here did anything wrong to get us closed down. A pandemic that threatened the health of the whole world forced us to close. It forced us to figure out how to be together while staying apart.

But look at everything we learned this past year—Zoom, YouTube, and so much more. We learned to be flexible, adaptable, and creative. We learned a lot about being the Church of Jesus Christ.

We can learn some things from Nehemiah and the people of Judah.

These lessons from the story of Nehemiah are going to be some of our priorities as we come back together in a new way.

- First, we need to continue to keep each other safe. Masks, vaccines, distance—all of that is there to keep you and the staff safe.
- We need to do what we can to rebuild this church for the next generation. The time to focus on the next generation is right now, when we're already being flexible, adaptable, and creative.
- We need to focus on the word of God, to shape our interior lives and to teach us how to serve.
- And finally, we should always remember to rejoice, to celebrate, and to make sure that no one around us goes without.

These next months are a critical time for this church. Join me in praying that we can all embrace these four lessons, and live into the blessing Nehemiah shared with his people.

Watch for details for our programs and ministries to start in the fall. We look forward to getting back to it—in all









#### **ENDOWMENT**

As predicted a month ago, the second quarter 2021 Endowment Fund ended with a healthy gain. On June 30, the Fund returned 5.16 percent, all from market growth, compared to three months earlier. And for the first half year, the Fund grew by 3.61 percent. Put another way the Fund expanded enough to not only recover the 2021 allotment of over \$33,000 but also it added over \$34,000.

The FPCSLO Endowment Fund is invested in the New Covenant Funds Balanced Growth Fund, owned by the Presbyterian Church (USA) Foundation.

Of course, there is no assurance that these earnings will continue or hold for the next six months; but they bode well that there will be more than enough reserves to allow for another allotment in 2022. The annually allotted funds are used to help pay for Christian Education and Youth Ministry, Missions, Worship and Music, Property maintenance, and general budget support.

Thank you to those who have invested in our church's future by donating to our endowment or have included First Presbyterian SLO in your wills or trusts. All gifts are used as the donors specified.

Have you prepared your will? NOW! is the best time to do it.

#### **BUDGET & FINANCE**

Our financial situation as of June indicates a weakening financial health that gives us some concern.

In the month of June 2021, total income was \$27,268 and total expenses were \$39,367. This decreased Total Reserves (our savings account) by \$12,099, leaving a balance of \$83,713 as of June 30, compared to the \$112,099 balance reached in January 2021. In other words, some of our operating expenses for the past five months have been funded out of Total Reserves.

Total giving was less for the past two months, averaging \$30,118 a month, which is less than average monthly giving previously this year. This gives the committee concern that we may not reach our budgeted giving level this year.

Expenses in the worship, education, and congregational life committees have been below plan because of curtailed activities during the pandemic. We anticipate increases in these committees, and perhaps in staffing once we resume in-person worship and education programs.

Session, particularly committee chairs, and staff will monitor spending in order to assure that critical elements of our mission will be fully funded.

Your continued faithful giving will enable FPCSLO to continue and enhance our service to the congregation and the community.

## PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN THANK OFFERING


