I have a handful of cousins who have served in the Navy. Some served regular enlistments and a few of the others made careers out of it—one retired as a Master Chief, the highest rank for a non-commissioned officer. She has some amazing stories to tell. At family get-togethers they would talk about their experiences—long deployments overseas, occasional dangers, and lots of funny stories.

They all talked about sea legs.

The dictionary defines "sea legs" as "a person's ability to keep their balance and not feel seasick when on board a moving ship". It takes a while to adjust to the movement of the water and the way it affects everything from a small patrol ship to the largest aircraft carrier. (Interestingly, the same process happens in reverse—after coming ashore it takes a while for the body to realize that the earth isn't moving like the ocean did.)

I wonder if we haven't all experienced something like sea legs over this last year and a half. We closed abruptly and then had to adjust to the unsteady feeling of an empty sanctuary and recorded services. As we got better at the technology we moved to Zoom, which gave us a sense of connectedness, but also highlighted just how much we missed being together. Over the last month or so we reopened with some restrictions, and now we're being vigilant about whether or not the new variant of COVID will close us again.

Anyone else feeling a little unsteady right about now?

Psalm 18 begins with these words:

I love you, Lord, my strength.

The Lord is my rock, my fortress and my deliverer;

my God is my rock, in whom I take refuge,

my shield and the horn of my salvation, my stronghold.

Whatever else might be unsteady in our lives, whether at home, at work or at school, or even at this church—whatever else might be moving and unpredictable, it's good to be reminded that God is our rock, that God's unshakeable nature is something we can trust and lean on in uncertain times. Now we all know that this isn't some magic trick that makes everything better or pain-free. There is a lot of mystery in this journey of faith, and embracing that with faith and trust in God is what we're called to do—who we're called to be—as disciples of Jesus Christ.

Still, it's a comfort to reflect on the Psalmist's words: "The Lord is my rock, my fortress and my deliverer." I think we're going to need that reminder as we look back on this year or more of uncertainty, and as we face the challenges ahead. God can be trusted. God can be leaned on. We're going to do both as we chart out a new course of service and witness in the coming year.

In the meantime we will continue to gather, continue to praise, continue to grow in our faith, and continue to serve (Think: Fellowship, Worship, Discipleship and Mission). Where and how we do church may change, but we will always be the Body of Christ in this community and for God's glory.

Welcome to a new church year. Time to test our sea legs.

BUDGET & FINANCE CONGREGATIONAL

Our financial situation as of June indicates a weakening financial health that gives us some concern.

In the month of June 2021, total income was \$27,268 and total expenses were \$39,367. This decreased Total Reserves (our savings account) by \$12,099, leaving a balance of \$83,713 as of June 30, compared to the \$112,099 balance reached in January 2021. In other words, some of our operating expenses for the past five months have been funded out of Total Reserves.

Total giving was less for the past two months, averaging within this changing COVID situation, \$30,118 a month, which is less than average monthly giving previously this year. This gives the committee For the Deacons as they care for our church family, concern that we may not reach our budgeted giving level this year.

Expenses in the worship, education, and congregational life committees have been below plan because of curtailed activities during the pandemic. We anticipate increases in these committees, and perhaps in staffing once we resume in-person worship and education programs.

Session, particularly committee chairs, and staff will Watson, who passed away in August, monitor spending in order to assure that critical elements of our mission will be fully funded.

Your continued faithful giving will enable FPCSLO to continue and enhance our service to the congregation and the community.

<u>The Midnight Library</u> a fiction book by Matt Haig has been added to the library and is available for borrowing.




Somewhere out beyond the edge of the universe there is a library that contains an infinite number of books, each one the story of another reality. One tells the story of your life as it is, along with another book for the other life you could have lived if you had made a different choice at



any point in your life. While we all wonder how our lives might have been, what if you had the chance to go to the library and see for yourself? Would any of these other lives truly be better?

In The Midnight Library Nora Seed finds herself faced with this decision. When the death of her cat proves to be the final straw, Nora decides to check out on life, and finds herself at the Midnight Library. "Even death was something Nora couldn't do properly, it seemed." But each book at this library tells the story of a life she could have had. Faced with the possibility of changing her life for a new one, following a different career, undoing old breakups, realizing her dreams of becoming a glaciologist; she must search within herself as she travels through the Midnight Library to decide what is truly fulfilling in life, and what makes it worth living in the first place.
