By October most of our church programs are well underway, and this year is no different. Wednesdays at the Rock is bringing kids to our campus and giving us a chance to share God's love with them. The Youth Group is having fun as they explore faith in meaningful ways—you'll see them more in the coming year! Our choirs—voice and bell—are underway, leading us in worship and preparing for the festive season ahead. On Thursday nights we're exploring the history of the Bible together on Zoom,

and we're learning new things about our sacred text. And it looks like we'll have a new members class next month, too. Things are moving and serving and growing as we enter into the fall season.

Another important part our autumn rhythm is the Stewardship Season. This is our annual conversation about our ministries together, and how we'll resource them for maximum impact. We'll begin this month, then celebrate our commitments together on the Sunday before Thanksgiving—it really is one of my favorite parts of the year.

It's important to me that we communicate our Stewardship plans clearly. It's not just filling holes with money, even if sometimes it feels that way—it's mostly a time of partnership as we create a vision for ministry alongside a plan for how to make it happen. What could be more fun? I'm not kidding. As a church committed to Jesus and his call on our lives, what could be more enjoyable and satisfying and inspiring than spending a few weeks talking about how to accomplish those things?

As you hear stories about the ministries of this church, let me invite you to consider how you can partner in this work. THE 2022 THANK OFFERING



Presbyterian Women collected \$1,460 earmarked for this year's Thank Offering, seeking "to do good to one another and to all," as Christ has called us to do (1 Thessalonians 5:15b-18). Gathered funds will bless the lives of hundreds of families, children, and people from marginalized communities.

Ten grants were selected to support eight synod projects and two international projects in Lebanon and Haiti. These projects include support to programs that will provide housing for disadvantaged people, health and nutrition education, life-skills, and job training and so much more. Housing programs include self-help projects following various natural disasters (floods, tornados, and earthquakes) and conversion of unused farmland for affordable housing for adults with multiple disabilities. The project in Haiti will address chronic and recurrent malnutrition of children and in Lebanon the enhancement of women with physical challenges in rural areas.

KAYENTA PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH CHRISTMAS GIFTS

Our church is gathering items to send to the Navajo people in Kayenta, Arizona, again this fall. We have a list of things that would be helpful to the congregation of the Presbyterian Church in Kayenta, as well as the community—such things as personal grooming items, towels (bath and kitchen), small purses, sewing supplies, tools, flashlights, picture frames, reading glasses, socks for all ages, baseball caps for men and boys, gloves of varying kinds, warm jackets and sweaters (many people wear large sizes such as 2X or 3X). There is always a need for school supplies or office supplies. And some of the older parishioners like to do puzzles. Last year our congregation shared so many gifts that we sent four large boxes early in December. PW also sends money to the church to help with food for their community Thanksgiving and Christmas meals.

Items can be brought to the Church Office during the week. We will also be collecting things on Sunday mornings in October and November at the Kiosk before and after worship.

MISSIONS GET ON THE BUS IS BACK

"Get On The Bus" brings children from throughout California to visit their parents who are incarcerated. For several years First Presbyterian Church has sponsored a bus bringing children to San Luis Obispo to spend special time with their fathers at CMC. For most of these children, the cost of traveling several hours from their home to the prison was prohibitive; so this was the only time during the year they were able to be with their parents.



"Get On The Bus" is a program of the Center For Restorative Justice Works and is funded through donations. Our sponsorship of a bus provides free transportation for the children and their chaperones, provides travel bags for the children, comfort care bags for the caregivers, a photo of each child with his or her parent, and meals for the day including breakfast, snacks on the bus, lunch at the prison, and dinner on the way home, all at no cost to the child.

After two years of cancelled "Get On The Bus" visits due to Covid, we are getting ready to participate at this year's event on Saturday, October 15. That afternoon at Mountainbrook Church, members from FPC will be volunteering at an ice cream party with the children and their chaperones after they have returned from their visit with their parents. Each child will be given a teddy bear, a letter from their parent, and a boxed dinner for the long bus ride back to their homes.



LIBRARY REVIEW

The Grieving Brain: The Surprising Science of How We Learn from Love and Loss by Mary-Frances O'Connor has been added to the library and is available for borrowing. It is located on the book cart.

This book gives us a fascinating new window into one of the hallmark experiences of being human. O'Connor has devoted decades to researching the effects of grief on the brain, and in this book, she makes cutting-edge neuroscience accessible through her contagious enthusiasm, and guides us through how we encode love and grief. With love, our neurons help us form attachments to others; but, with loss, our brain must come to terms with where our loved ones went, or how to imagine a future that encompasses their absence. This book combines storytelling, accessible science, and practical knowledge that will help us better understand what happens when we grieve and how to navigate loss with more ease and grace. WHAT IS STEPHEN MINISTRY?

Our church has long been a sponsor of Stephen Ministry. It has ebbed and flowed in terms of its presence. Today we have 3 Stephen Ministers and we work closely with an ecumenical SM in our area. There are about 20 persons in the county who have completed training as SMs. come from Presbyterian, Episcopal, Methodist, Congregational and Catholic congregations and meet together regularly for further training. SM is a trained companion on our journey in life, especially when we have encountered some "rough patches" and need a 'friend".

One person tells of a time in her journey when she had moved to a new community but her family was in process of moving to a different place and she found herself terribly alone. The pastor in her new church recognized her loneliness and helped her to be assigned a SM. They met weekly. It seemed to go slowly at first. She was hesitant to talk about her deeper feelings and loneliness. However, she adds, my "SM did a wonderful job of creating a caring space for me to process my emotions and work through my issues." She found that it was not advice she needed but help setting aside her hurts and uncertainties and encouragement to work through her issues. In that weekly time together, she felt the unconditional love, a love God has for each of us, as we journey through life.

A caring SM can help us whenever we have a difficult time in life. They are not trained professional counselors, but dedicated to sharing Christ's love with those they serve. Any issue can seem unsolvable but with a trusted supporter as our friend, we can reflect on the situation and find the best direction to go. In our church, please let Pastor John (805-543-5451) or SM Leader Jim Seeber (805-535-5613) know if you or someone around you might benefit from some temporary encouragement in the dealing with life.





