

Waiting has never been my strong suit. People who have known me for a long time would never refer to me as, well, patient. I've gotten a little better with age, but it's been a long wait!

Learning to wait—to live in a state of expectation—is the discipline of the Advent season. Yeah, we know how the story will end up, but each year we transport ourselves back to a time when God's people waited for the Messiah to come, with varying levels of patience.

Even the songs reflect the theme of waiting in anticipation.

"O come, O come Emmanuel" "Come, thou long-expected Jesus"

Waiting is the heart of Advent, as we remember the coming of Jesus, and learn to wait for his promised return.

I'll be honest, I've had plenty of lessons in waiting this season. When I was diagnosed with some significant heart disease in October, they told me not to wait too long to do something about it. As it happened, December 1st was my surgery date—it has felt like a long time to wait to get myself fixed up.

The completion of the surgery will bring another set of lessons: I have to spend the first two weeks near enough to the hospital that a home care person can drop in for some visits. I can't pick up anything that weighs more than 10 pounds for the first month. I can't drive for a minimum of six weeks. See what I mean? Even after the surgery I'll be waiting for these new limitations to pass.

I suppose this is the perfect season to learn some lessons in patience. The Israelites waited for centuries to receive the Messiah God had promised, and the Church has waited 2000 years for Christ's return. My lessons may seem huge to me, but they're pretty small compared to what God's people had to endure. If Advent is about learning to wait all over again for the Son of God to come, I'm glad for the chance to learn that lesson all over again (mostly!).

How about you? How will you take on the practice of waiting and watching in your own celebration of Christmas this year? The joy of Jesus' birth feels all the more fresh and exciting when we do the work of remembering how hard it is to wait for a promise to be fulfilled.

Let me encourage you to spend a little time practicing how to wait during this Advent season. I think it will make your Christmas deeper and more meaningful. In the meantime, remember that even in our waiting we claim God's promises to heal our hearts and draw us together in unity. Here's a verse from "O Come, O Come Emmanuel":

O come, desire of nations, bind, In one the hearts of all mankind. Bid Thou our sad divisions cease, And be Thyself our King of peace.

Blessings to you and yours this Advent and Christmas season! I'll be waiting impatiently to be back with you in the New Year.

When the Church Was a Family, by Joseph Hellerman, has been added to the library and is available for borrowing. It is located on the book cart.



ENDOWMENT

INCLUDING FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN YOUR WILL OR ESTATE PLAN

It seems every charitable organization from the animal shelter to radio stations is asking to be included in our estate plans. Every non-profit has learned: if you don't ask you won't get. First Presbyterian Church of San Luis Obispo has long sought to keep members aware of the need and opportunity to be included in your estate plan. Numerous past and present members have taken the steps to do just that. Today's members are benefiting from gifts made by past members and we need to do the same for future members, in perpetuity.

• There are a variety of LIFE INCOME PLANNING tools that enable you to provide for the present and future of our church while allowing income for you or your loved ones. These include (but are not limited to) Charitable Remainder Trusts, Charitable Gift Annuities, Pooled Income Funds, Permanent Funds, and Family Foundations. It doesn't take a lot of money to contribute to the Fund. Some of our current endowments were started with gifts of modest sums that have grown over the years. As with all financial decisions, anyone considering stewardship using one of the above methods should seek appropriate tax, legal, or financial counsel. If you don't currently have an advisor, the Endowment Committee or Church office can suggest professionals in this area who can provide these services.

• TRANSFER of securities (stocks, bonds, mutual funds) and ASSIGNMENT of Life Insurance Policies and IRAs are also attractive ways to give, often providing greater tax benefits to the donor than a simple gift of cash. REAL ESTATE also provides a unique gift opportunity. You can make a gift of your home and still retain the use of it during your lifetime. The decision about how your bequest will be use is yours. And, what better time to further your desires and goals for our Church than December as we celebrate the birth of Christ our Lord. Your tax deductible, year-end Endowment gift can be designated for broad areas of mission or ministry. You can specify a particular need or cause you support, or you can leave your gift undesignated. If you desire, the FPC Endowment Committee can assist you to make an appropriate designation of your gift

Life Income Plans can provide income to the donors, tax benefits, and a professional management of funds and a new way to support the work of the Church. To help get you started, a general brochure that briefly covers a number of the options available has been created by the Endowment Committee and is available to interested members upon request.

Contributions to an existing fund can be made by cash, check, securities, or by debit/credit card. Contributions are accepted personally by the Church Treasurer, at any time online, or mailed to First Presbyterian Church San Luis Obispo, Attn. Church Treasurer.
