

Welcome to Lent.

This month we'll celebrate Ash Wednesday, the first day of the season of Lent. For us, Lent is the 40 non-Sundays between today and Easter. Why just the non-Sundays? Because even as we enter this time of reflection and repentance, we know how the rest of the story works out—Jesus comes, he loves, he dies, and he is resurrected from the dead. We remember and celebrate that truth, even during Lent.

During this Lenten season I will be preaching through a series on the Great Ends of the Church as we see them defined in our Presbyterian tradition. We'll reflect

on Christ's sacrifice, and also on what it means for us today as we faithfully live out the mission of the church. As I have in the past, let me also invite all of you to join me in a Lent Challenge—saying the Lord's Prayer five times each day during this season. It's an exercise, a spiritual discipline, designed to help us align our hearts to Jesus using the words he taught us to pray.

But what about Lent?

This is my favorite introduction to the season, taken from a book by Henri Nouwen called Show me the Way. Lent is a hard season for us because it represents a call to repentance, reflection and a handful of other things we're not so good at. Still, taking 40 days or so to think about Christ's work in our lives before we dive into the happy hymns and chocolate bunnies of Easter can't be a bad thing. Here's the quote:

God's mercy is greater than our sins.

There is an awareness of sin that does not lead to God but to self-preoccupation. Our temptation is to be so impressed by our sins and failures and so overwhelmed by our lack of generosity that we get stuck in a paralyzing guilt. It is the guilt that says: 'I am too sinful to deserve God's mercy.' It is the guilt that leads to introspection instead of directing our eyes to God. It is the guilt that has become an idol and therefore a form of pride.

Lent is the time to break down this idol and to direct our attention to our loving Lord. The question is: 'Are we like Judas, who was so overcome by his sin that he could not believe in God's mercy any longer and hanged himself, or are we like Peter who returned to his Lord with repentance and cried bitterly for his sins?'

The season of Lent, during which winter and spring struggle with each other for dominance, helps us in a special way to cry out for God's mercy.

Isn't that beautiful and haunting and challenging all at the same time? I tend to think so much of my own failures that I forget that my sin is not the point. God's grace, given to us through Jesus Christ, is the true point of my life's story, and yours...and yours...and yours...

We live out that struggle between the seasons on a daily basis, between the death and darkness of winter and the restored and rediscovered life of spring. Between the awareness of just how far we stray from God, and the shock at what he has accomplished in order to draw us near. Lent is our time to pause and take notice of what is happening around us and in us. It's not just for self-reflection, though that's a key part of it. Lent is a time to sharpen our focus on Christ and his world, on the needs of people around us, on the gifts we've been given to meet those needs, and to discover all over again the hope that we have because of the Easter miracle.

But I'm getting ahead of myself.

Easter will come, but for now we try to re-create the sense of conviction that being in God's presence prompts in each one of us. To repent and ask for forgiveness. And to anticipate that day when life wins the battle once and for all.

Welcome to Lent.






REVIEW

Liturgy of the Ordinary: Sacred Practices in

Everyday Life by Tish Harrison Warren has been added to the library and is available for borrowing. It is located on the book cart. This was one of the resources used for planning the Women's Retreat in 2023.



In the overlooked moments and routines of our day, we can become aware of God's presence in surprising ways. How do we embrace the sacred in the ordinary and the ordinary in the sacred?

Framed around one typical day, this book explores life through the lens of liturgy – small practices and habits that form us. In each chapter, Tish Harrison Warren considers a common daily experience—making the bed, brushing her teeth, and losing her keys. Drawing from the diversity of her life as a campus minister, Anglican priest, friend, wife, and mother, Warren opens up a practical theology of the everyday. Pamalee Brady

With two younger brothers (twins) and loving Christian parents, Pamalee was born in San Francisco. She started college as an art major, but coming from a family of teachers, ironically, Pamalee stated that she did not want to teach and chose to transfer to Cal Poly, initially in Architecture, but ultimately graduating in Architec-tural Engineering. She continued her education at Berkely, where she graduated with a Masters in Civil Engineering. Working with CERL (Construction Engineering Research Laboratories) in Champaign, Illinois, she found she enjoyed working with the young PhD engineers. So, she transferred to the University of Illinois, graduat-ed with a PhD and decided to teach. This is also where she met her husband. Eric.

Before retiring from Cal Poly, Pamalee was an accomplished and tenured profes-sor, known specifically for looking after and caring for the downtrodden-- those with financial need and those that are first generation college students. She worked on Operation Sandcastle with local K-12 students, where they made sandcastles on the beach and learned a little structural engineering. Moving out of her comfort zone,

she traveled to Nepal with students as they assisted in the earthquake aftermath. As a working mom, loving wife, and lifelong Christian, while her son Alec grew up, Pamalee served on our church's Session, chairing the Education Committee, coor-dinated adult education, and taught Sunday school. She organizes and runs our church's Homeless dinner program at 40 Prado. She serves as Treasurer on the Board of Deacons. She serves on the Presbyterian Women's executive board, just recently being elected as Moderator; and helps lead the Virginia Terry Circle. Amazingly, with all of this on her plate, she underwent chemotherapy and is a cancer survivor.

Jenifer Rabenaldt

The youngest of five children, Jenifer was born in Akron, Ohio, to Bob and Ruth Gordon, and moved with her family to San Luis Obispo when she was five years old. Shortly thereafter, the Gordons joined our church. Jenifer was active in Sunday School and the youth groups through graduation from SLO High School, where she enthusiastically participated in drama, music, and dance, which led her to act and work behind the scenes in the school's musicals. Graduating from Cal Poly in education, she worked in a number of positions including that of a waitress in Pismo Beach where she met her husband Bill and in San Luis Obispo with her dad helping run Gordon's Floral Design Studio and adorning our sanctuary with beautiful flower arrangements. This very busy, talented, creative, friendly, loving, hardworking Christian woman is the mother to Ian, a daughter to Bob, a sister, a widow, and a grandmother to three grandchildren (with one more on the way). Throughout the years, Jenifer has been actively involved with our church. She has been the wedding and memorial coordinator. But she is most known for her roles in Christian Education as a parent helper, teacher, and ultimately director. She has coordinated Vacation Bible

School, Wednesdays at the Rock, Youth groups, Youth Sunday services, Advent nights, and Christmas plays. She ministers to God's children of all ages, from the nursery to the weekly Sunday Children's message to adult education, and to the Bible study she leads for seniors at The Villages. As her bio on the church website states, Jen "believes education is at the core of our faith and is a lifelong adventure," and we all have her mantra stuck in our brains, "Love God, Love People, and Do Things."

Please join us in applauding these two lovely ladies for all of their accomplishments and their contributions to our church and the community.

BUDGET AND FINANCE ENDOWMENT

Create A Lasting Legacy: STATE OF FPCSLO ENDOWMENT

Our church's endowment is in good condition. The chart below illustrates the power of this investment for the future of First Presbyterian San Luis Obispo; the dollar amount of growth is shown, which results from an 11.6% annual increase. The Endowment committee, at its January 2024 meeting recognizing the generous growth, voted to recommend to Session a 5% allotment which would mean \$38,876 for FPC programs and missions.

As readers of this column know, our church's endowment is invested in the Presbyterian Foundation's Balanced Growth Fund, a blend of environmentally and socially responsible stocks and bonds. The stock and bond markets did well last year.

Since 1999, our endowment has, in most years, allotted funds to FPC SLO programs and missions, including the general fund. The total allotments across those years amount to over \$337,000. This is great news for which we should congratulate ourselves.

The 2023 allotment was \$31,049, of which \$6,660 was used to help pay church operating expenses while the balance helped fund CE, Worship, Missions, Property Maintenance, and more.

While the \$6,600 used for church operations amounted to just 1.3% of the 2023 general fund income, it is of growing importance. Each year, as the endowment increases in value, the amount

to help fund the church's operations grows. All parts of the Endowment are important for the future life of First Pres, but the funds which support the general fund are vitally important. Keep in mind our church's endowment grows from both market increases and new donations. The last new gift to the endowment was a year ago. The Lagacy Giving team, the Endowment Committee, Will be seeking a few new gifts to the Fund in 2024, to help our church grow into the future. Will you be the next Lasting Legacy donor?


