

When we talk about our shared financial partnership, what we're really talking about are the ways we're going to answer God's call to be disciples of Jesus in this place. That sounds much more exciting, right? Between now and Thanksgiving we're all going to participate in this important time of reflection to see what God wants from us at First Pres SLO.

Your session has been talking about this. Earlier in the year I asked them what our shared priorities ought to be, and you would have been proud to hear that discussion. We agreed that we wanted to be a refuge for the vulnerable in our communities—unhoused people, families who struggled to provide adequate food, and LGBTQ youth.

Some of this is already happening. Kate Murray is kicking off our Sunday morning adult class. Green Pastures is ramping up again and will begin serving the community again on November 1st. Our commitment to 40 Prado continues with some renewed energy.

We are already living into our commitment to be God's church in SLO.

And there's plenty more to do.

This month as you hear these stories and learn about the ministries of this church, let me invite you to renew and grow your giving. It isn't just about budgeting and number crunching (though we're pretty good at those!), it's about a tangible commitment to be active and sacrificial in living out our calling as this community of faith.

I look forward to this month of conversations. I hope you will, too.


ADULT EDUCATION

Two copies of Peace Be with You, by Rev. Dr. Garrett Andrew and Linda Abbott Trapp, have been added to the library and are available for borrowing. They are located on the book cart. They have been donated by Presbyterian Women. The statistics



for the mental and physical health of Americans are terrifying. The news of our days is filled with war, economic turmoil, political dysfunction, and environmental catastrophe. This is a book that honestly confronts these issues with hope that comes from the combined experience of two different authors with experiences in counseling, coaching, preaching, writing, and leading people on journeys to peace. This timely and short book can be used as a workbook in small groups, or read individually, and offers practical tools combined with deep wisdom to help guide you from anxiety to inner peace and serenity. One of the authors is Rev. Dr. Andrew, who is the pastor of Nipomo Community Presbyterian Church, with experience in diverse church and religious settings. A seasoned and award-winning preacher, Dr. Andrew has an ability to make scriptures come alive and speak to the lives and situations of those who hear him and read his writings. BUDGET AND FINANCE ENDOWMENT

Create A Lasting Legacy: Charitable Remainder Trust

This month's column is a testimonial regarding another form of life income plan.

At age 64, Susan M. decides it's time to sit down with her accountant to examine her estate plans. As the daughter of a missionary, Susan has always had a desire to make a gift to benefit those less fortunate and wanted to find a way to make it possible. Making a lifetime outright gift was not feasible. After a careful review, she discovers the securities she bought for \$20,000 have appreciated in value and now are worth over \$100,000. Susan opts to use those appreciated securities to fund a CHARITABLE REMAINDER TRUST that provides her with an annual 6% payment—more than 2 times what she was receiving from dividends on the securities. She is also able to claim a charitable contribution on her tax return as well as avoid realizing a long-term capital gain. The trust she created will ultimately benefit a Presbyterian Disaster Relief Fund in war-torn countries.

In your estate, you may have assets that will provide income for your future security. As in Susan's experience above, you can make a generous gift now to benefit the Endowment Fund for this church and receive the income you need. A gift given to establish a life income plan allows you to do both. Through a CHARITABLE REMAINDER TRUST, you can make a gift of cash, securities, or property, and receive lifetime income if that is your wish. Or such a plan can be part of your will to provide income for a loved one. After the lifetime of the beneficiary, the gift is given to this church's Endowment Fund.

As a postscript to the September column discussing the possibility of converting an existing annuity into a Charitable Gift Annuity, the outcome is that it can't be done. That is

not accomplished without creating a taxable transaction. But, the annuity proceeds can be used to fund a Charitable Remainder Trust.


MISSIONS PEACE AND GLOBAL WITNESS SPECIAL OFFERING
