

As we start a new church year, my first as your called pastor, I'm making plans for how we can work together to grow our ministry for the next generation. We have so much good work to do!

I want to develop my role as an equipping pastor—someone who helps identify gifts and calling, and works to grow both for service to Jesus. I love this part of my job.

In my relationship to the whole congregation, it's my responsibility to communicate the wide range of opportunities for growing in spiritual maturity and effective service. That's the focus of my teaching and preaching, my conversations and counseling, and (maybe most importantly) my listening. My role is to invite each person who makes First Pres their church home to hear God's call, and then to help them live into that call in a meaningful way.

Here's how I plan to do that.

My goal is to be in a cycle of relationship that follows this pattern:

To inspire,

To equip,

To resource,

To celebrate.

Preaching and teaching are my primary means of inspiration. That's more than just getting excited about something—it's helping people find the place where God is stirring in their hearts.

Equipping is helping people walk through the process of praying about their calling, and growing spiritually in a way that allows them to step into a new role in ministry or service.

Resourcing is helping to organize the space and/or funding that is needed in order for this new area of service can be most effective.

Finally, it's good for us to celebrate when some new effort or ministry bears fruit in the congregation or community. We don't do this part enough!

If you've read this far, here's my invitation. In addition to the way I will be doing this work with the whole congregation, I would like to enter into a more focused process of personal growth with ten people in the congregation. We'll use the four steps to give us direction, and see where God might be calling you to deeper service. This will be a serious commitment—it will take time and effort and training. FROM THE CRE

Crossing Currents 2023

Thank you for supporting me as I traveled to Minneapolis for the Crossing Currents event. It was a powerful and inspiring day and a half sponsored by the Office of the General Assembly (OGA) I was honored to represent the Presbytery of Santa Barbara and First Pres SLO. It was an honor to be asked to be a part of this discernment process. We were asked to be there because the leadership was told they needed to hear from us and to listen to us. Not because we even pretend to have the answers but because we have the energy and passion to be a part of the Church moving forward.

We were called to discern what God has in store for us and is inviting us into as an expression of Christ's body in the PC(USA). We were asked to discuss things like; What does it mean to be a Church today and in the next few years? What

does leadership in the Church mean or look like? How do we form leaders in the Church? What does a specifically Reformed ecclesiology look like and mean as the Church is "being reformed" at this time? What are the ecclesial formation needs in the PC(USA)? What would be some initial steps we can take now to move us further into this future even as it continues to unfold before us?

We were reminded that questions are the answers (Hal Gregerson).

We talked a lot about boundaries/containers and what are the boundaries between form and freedom. It is not about the container itself; it is about the content. How can we be a part of where God is already working in the world. How can we walk alongside the Spirit that is already here? The "sparks" - where are they and how can we inflame them. It was said that we do not need a revival - we need a renewal. A revival is bringing back the past, a renewal is moving forward and doing better. The best analogy I heard was that we should not be considered the frozen chosen any longer - it is time to become the thawed awed.

We talked a lot about energy. Potential energy -vs-kinetic energy. How can we tap into the potential energy all around us? Structures, boundaries, polity should these things be reformed and made current. What is holding us back? What will enable us to move forward and change as needed to become successful and productive?

We talked a lot about liminality. Is it time to take a giant leap over the threshold or do we stand there for a while. I am all for taking the giant leap. And, most definitely not stepping back. Energy is powerful and can and should be used in positive and powerful ways. We recognized we cannot do this alone. It is about having conversations and asking questions. It is about

partnering with others even if they do things differently. We really are better together.


We heard stories from leaders that were inspiring and gut wrenching. The perseverance demonstrated was fueled by the Holy Spirit and it was obvious. When God calls, we need to listen. We need to not only listen but not be afraid to follow that call. Even if moving forward means removing structures and breaking down barriers. We need to be creative in our ministries. Especially those ministries that are calling and searching for something new. Ministries that do not look like they did 50 years ago. The Church needs to model and become the Church of 2023. To move forward boldly. To break down what needs to be broken down and use those pieces to build something new.

LIBRARY REVIEW

The Baker Expository Dictionary of Biblical Words edited by Tremper Longman and Mark Strauss has been added to the Reference section of the library and is available for reading in the library. This newly published (2023) resource



is designed for anyone interested in researching (or just reading about) the original Hebrew and Greek words from which our Bible is translated into English. For example, the very first entry in this dictionary is the English word "abandon." You will read that two Hebrew words (natas, azab) are translated as abandon in the Old Testament. In the New Testament, there are three Greek words so translated (aphistemi,

enkataleipo, exodos). Does that last one sound familiar? Each Hebrew and Greek word has a short article explaining how and where it is used in Scripture and what its distinguishing nuance might be. Each English entry cross references other English words used to translate the same Hebrew or Greek word, since all words have a semantic range and nuance related to context. For this first entry, you would also want to look up the entries on "leave," neglect," refuse," and "reject." Full disclosure: FPSLO member Kate Murray wrote that first article and contributed the Greek articles for 80 English entries in this resource - some much more theologically interesting than "abandon." For example, check out the articles on "servant," "slave," and "sin." Also, check out the excellent introduction by the editors that more fully explains this book's purpose and use. Kate is pleased to donate this resource to our library and hopes it will be useful. (Reviewed by Kate Murray)

Create A Lasting Legacy

CHARITABLE GIFT ANNUITIES (CGA) were described in the July-August edition of this column. As a review, a CHARITABLE GIFT ANNUITY provides you, or someone you love, with lifetime income at a fixed rate. A portion of the gift annuity will also provide future support for First Presbyterian Church, San Luis Obispo, or another selected ministry. It is a practical solution for those who would like to make a gift but may need income during retirement.

Here is an idea worth considering. Do you have an old, or not so old, annuity contract which you are not using? That is an annuity which has not been turned into regular income? What are you going to do with that dusty, neglected part of your financial portfolio?

A recent inquiry at FPC, SLO has resulted in our learning that such a forgotten annuity can be exchanged for a new contract, a Charitable Gift Annuity, at the PCUSA Foundation.

Following the first request for such an exchange the Treasurer related to a Foundation attorney who has further brought in the CGA consultant. We fully expect the exchange to be accomplished before the next column is written.

Who will be next to exchange an old annuity for a CGA? Please contact any member of the Endowment Committee. Or simply invest in a new CGA at the Foundation.

MISSIONS GETTING TO KNOW SMART SHARE HOUSING SOLUTIONS

As a Mathew 25 church, we are tasked with eradicating systemic poverty. One way is to find creative ways to provide affordable housing for our low wage-earning neighbors.

The Mission Committee would like to introduce you to a little-known organization in SLO County that helps provide low-income housing for people. It is called Smart Share Housing Solutions. They offer three programs with one goal--to create more energy efficient, safe, affordable housing, and to empower our community. The first program--HomeShare

SLO-- matches a person with an extra bedroom with someone seeking housing. Applicants are vetted by HomeShare and rent ranges from \$750 - \$800 month and both participants sign a contract about the arrangements. Support is given throughout the shared arrangement. Another program is ADU SLO, created to assist property owners on the coordination of adding housing units using backyards, garages, infill lot and existing buildings. They also support Tiny House on Wheels in backyards.

Finally, SmartShare has joined in a partnership with the City of SLO on the Waterman Village Project. This is a micro village in development in downtown SLO (on Dana Street) to create a car-free community of tiny houses.


GREEN PASTURES

Green Pastures has been a part of First
Presbyterian Church's ministry to the
community since the 1990's. Begun by Richard
Wardlaw and Dorie Larson and others, Green
Pastures provided financial aid or supplies to
meet such needs as transportation, utility
payments, clothing or eyeglasses. They also
provided counseling and directions for use of
other community services, such as CAPSLO,
encouragement and a prayer.

November 1st is the target date for reestablishing this mission, with the plan to be open the first and third Wednesdays of the month. The new model of Green Pastures will be to focus on helping individuals stay in their housing. We will provide "Micro Grants" for financial needs such as rent, utility, medial and other bills.


